THE POWER OF THE *ASIAN COMMUNITY FUND*

Launched in 2020, the Asian Community Fund (ACF) at the Boston Foundation is a **permanent resource** designed to galvanize and unite the diverse ethnicities within the AAPI community, incubate new partnerships, and build a stronger advocacy voice.

Today, Asian Americans are the fastest growing and most diverse racial group in Massachusetts, contributing billions of dollars to the local economy. And yet for far too long, our community has been marginalized and overlooked. **ACF was created to meet this challenge head on.** Since our founding, ACF has convened thousands of residents, incubated vital statewide coalitions, and catalyzed millions of dollars in new giving for AAPI residents.

The Asian Community Fund **aims to be the connective tissue that unifies our region's rich landscape** of AAPI residents, businesses, and community organizations. We see a future where AAPI residents across Massachusetts and our neighbors overcome systemic gaps in health and wealth, and thrive together.

THE POWER OF *PARTNERSHIPS*



FOUNDING YEAR

ACF is formalized as a **field of interest fund at the Boston Foundation**, thanks to the leadership of Paul W. Lee, Helen Chin Schlichte, and Stephan Chan. An Advisory Committee is developed to shape the vision for the region's first-ever AAPI focused fund. Founding supporters join the call to seed ACF, raising an initial \$1 million to power the fund's operations.



2021 | *YEAR 1*

ACF hires its first Director. Committees and working groups are initiated to produce a **new seminal research report** on needs of AAPI residents in Greater Boston and build ACF's grantmaking and civic leadership strategy. ACF anchors the region's inaugural list of Most Influential AAPI Leaders and mobilizes its first grants and convenings to **respond to the COVID-19 pandemic and the surge of anti-Asian hate**.



2022 | *YEAR 2*

ACF launches the **Asian Business Empowerment Council (ABEC)**—a statewide hub and champion for Asian-owned businesses, closing an important gap in the state's business ecosystem. ACF releases its first open grantmaking cycle, distributing resources to 35 non-profits, including frontline organizations focusing on COVID-19 recovery and community partners working together as a part of ACF's **AAPI Mental Health Collaborative**.



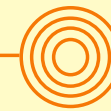
2023 | YEAR 3

ACF introduces signature convenings, including the **#ShopAAPI Holiday Night Market** and the **AAPI Arts & Culture Summit**, creating new platforms to strengthen networks and elevate AAPI leadership. A new statewide coalition, the **AAPI Arts & Culture Collaborative**, emerges from ACF's leadership to unify the region's cultural sector and amplify AAPI visibility.



2024 | YEAR 4

ACF hosts the inaugural **Asian Community Fund Gala**, which quickly grows into the largest annual gathering of AAPI leaders and allies in our region. ACF also expands its role as a convener and connector across industries, formalizing a partnership with **Asians in Biotech** to advance leadership development for AAPI professionals across the life sciences sector.



2025 | YEAR 5

ACF reaches a **new level of scale and impact**, exceeding \$12 million to date raised for our local AAPI community and supporting 115 Asian-serving non-profits statewide through grantmaking. ACF continues to **mobilize key policy coalitions**, advocating to strengthen our region's cultural and business sectors and permanently establish Fred Korematsu Day in Massachusetts.

AAPI Arts & Culture Collaborative

The [AAPI Arts & Culture Collaborative](#)—a key initiative of the Asian Community Fund—**convenes and catalyzes the AAPI arts and culture community** across Massachusetts to take collective action and drive policy and systems change. Since its formalization in summer 2024, the Collaborative has engaged 290 AAPI arts leaders, creatives, and allies across the state; commissioned the first-ever statewide inventory of the AAPI culture sector; and mobilized working groups focused on three strategic pillars:

AAPI Mental Health Collaborative

The AAPI Mental Health Collaborative at ACF supports local AAPI community organizations in developing and **expanding innovations that address the behavioral health needs of local AAPI residents.** In partnership with our AAPI nonprofit partners, we are working collectively to increase collaboration across the sector, share learnings, and address systemic barriers to treatment and care.

MILESTONES



SUMMER 2022

ACF launches the AAPI Mental Health Collaborative, solidifying a partnership with 13 AAPI-serving community organizations and investing in their capacity to participate in this initiative.



FALL 2022

The Collaborative begins to meet regularly, with each conversation focused on a different aspect of the mental health ecosystem. Members identify addressing the workforce pipeline and increasing support for AAPI mental health counseling students as the Collaborative's priority.



FALL 2023

A new pilot program launches to expand supervisory capability at three frontline AAPI community organizations and invest in cultivating and retaining multilingual AAPI counseling staff.



NOW

As part of the Blue Cross Blue Shield Foundation's 2025-2026 Racial Justice Cohort, the Collaborative is working to address three areas of need: 1) expanding opportunities for staff training and mental health first aid, 2) broadening the pipeline of multilingual/multicultural clinicians and student interns, and 3) creating a pool of resources to cover private-pay sessions.



Advocacy

The Asian Community Fund invests in advocacy work to **strengthen the collective power and voice of AAPI communities** across Massachusetts. Through our policy strategy, ACF is driving progress on issues that matter—from anchoring the statewide coalition working to **recognize Fred Korematsu Day in Massachusetts** to testifying in support of inclusive education, business equity, and the state’s growing cultural sector.

We also play a role in strengthening the capacity of community leaders, creatives, and small business owners to engage in advocacy efforts. By cultivating civic leadership and **deepening engagement in the policymaking process**, we are helping ensure that AAPI perspectives are represented and reflected in decisions that shape our communities.

Research

At the Asian Community Fund, we believe that advancing equity for AAPI communities begins with being seen and understood. Since our inception five years ago, ACF has helped **commission five research reports centering AAPI voices and stories.**

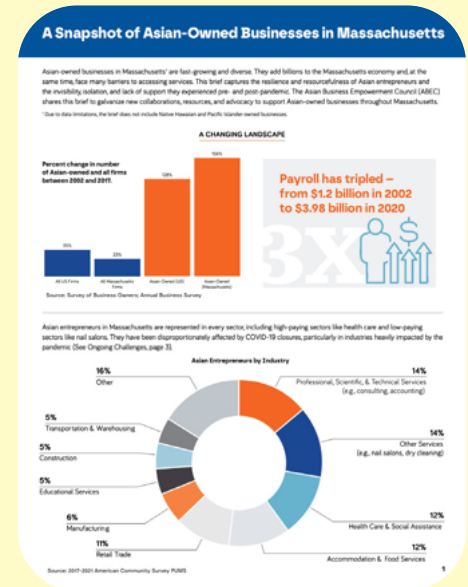
Too often, AAPI residents are rendered invisible in mainstream research and policy-making. Furthermore, the use of aggregate racial categories can mask the wide range of lived experiences, languages, cultures, and needs within our diverse and growing population.

By collaborating with community organizations and research partners, we are **deepening understanding of the strengths and experiences of AAPI residents** across Massachusetts. Building AAPI Power

AAPI communities in Greater Boston are rapidly growing and deeply diverse, but broad data often masks significant disparities within the population. This report by Boston Indicators and the Asian Community Fund **provides a more nuanced community profile, elevating inequities in income, representation, and opportunity** while underscoring the need for disaggregated data and targeted strategies to support AAPI communities.



Business Snapshot

Asian-owned businesses in Massachusetts have experienced tremendous growth and are having an increasingly significant impact on the state's economy. Yet many entrepreneurs continue to face barriers. This brief report outlines these challenges and **calls for greater access to capital, targeted outreach and language services, and disaggregated data collection** to better support and advocate for the needs of AAPI-owned businesses.



Setting Roots

This multi-year study led by the Asian Business Empowerment Council (ABEC) at the Asian Community Fund **examines the complex challenges and opportunities facing AAPI entrepreneurs.** Local AAPI businesses have grown by 187 percent in the past two decades, yet this progress masks diverse challenges shaped by sector, immigration history, and language—disrupting the narrative of uniform success.



No Longer Invisible

A lack of visibility presents real consequences for Massachusetts Asian and Pacific Islander American (APIA) communities, in terms of political representation, services, and support. This community survey report, produced by a collaborative team of APIA-serving organizations and MassINC Polling Group, **sheds light on how local residents are faring across a wide swath of political, social, and economic issues.**



Making Waves

This first-of-its-kind report **marks a significant milestone in advancing the visibility of AAPI artists and cultural organizations** in Massachusetts. It brings together the results of a statewide survey of 150 AAPI creative professionals, one-on-one interviews, and listening sessions aiming to highlight the strengths, challenges, and opportunities of the region's AAPI cultural sector.



Grantmaking

Through its grantmaking, the Asian Community Fund strives to catalyze new partnerships, respond to urgent community needs, and expand the capacity of the local AAPI nonprofit, business, and cultural sectors. As the first and only fund in Massachusetts exclusively dedicated to supporting AAPI residents, **the Asian Community Fund has distributed over \$2.3 million total in grants since its founding in 2020, supporting 115 organizations statewide.** We are proud to partner with these community nonprofits in uplifting prosperity and well-being for AAPI residents.
